PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT AND ENRICHMENT

We encourage all students to develop and enhance skills essential to moving into higher education and employment – we know that means much more than just academic achievement alone.

You will have access to opportunities both within and outside of lessons, so you can learn and hone new skills, or further develop your existing talents, to support you in life beyond sixth form.

We encourage personal development and expect all students to participate in at least one aspect of our enrichment programme, which includes but is not limited to

- debate society
- Young Engineers
- student council
- self-defence for women

- sports and fitness
- subject and literacy mentoring

Each week we timetable an enrichment period, in which we invite external speakers in to deliver inspiring and informative sessions. These offer thought-provoking discussion, reflection and independent research, and have previously included safe driving, drugs and alcohol, safe sex, the importance of voting, banking and higher education.

Visits and international travel

Linked to a number of courses are opportunities to experience new cultures and environments, and to discover how you can apply your studies in real life contexts. We arrange visits throughout the year, both in the UK and further afield. In previous years, our students have ventured to Switzerland, Germany, Poland, Spain and France to name a few putting their learning and knowledge into practice.

The Ogden Trust also provides specific grants for A Level physics students to visit CERN in Switzerland at two-year intervals, with funding allocated to groups of academies who work in close collaboration for the benefit of the students.

You will also be given the opportunity to visit some of the country's top universities to get a feel for what to expect from an academic, personal development and social perspective.

Work experience

In year 12, you will complete work experience related to your career of choice or the education pathway you wish to follow. You will be expected to select, apply and interview for roles, and represent both yourself and Hucknall Sixth Form Centre in a professional, business-like manner.


STAND OUT FROM THE CROWD THE EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION

All of our year 13 students complete the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) as part of their ongoing development and study. The EPQ is highly valued by universities and businesses as evidence of a range of transferable skills required for higher education and employment.

In the EPQ, you will have the opportunity to choose your own topic area to research, ideally linked to your future studies or career aspirations. You will produce either a 5,000 word research dissertation on this topic or develop an artefact with a 2,000 word research report. You will then plan, research, develop and evaluate your project throughout the year. This is supported by sessions which build on skills such as independent study and research, organisation, time management, presentation skills and reflection.

Successful past dissertation EPQ projects include diverse projects on business marketing, psychological and biological research into Alzheimer's and autism, causes of the Spanish Civil War, causes of the 2008 economic crash, and the development of paramedic science and dentistry. Examples of excellent artefact EPQ projects include architectural design, jewellery making, photography, creative writing and computer programming.

The EPQ will give you a sense of achievement, an opportunity for individual research on a topic you are interested in and a very valuable qualification for inclusion on UCAS or job applications.



ADVICE AND GUIDANCE

We have a defined support system for all of our students, helping you to achieve your potential and aspire to reach further. We offer both pastoral and academic support, with guidance on financial, educational and career matters.

You will receive regular updates on your progress from your course teachers and personal tutors. Based on your GSCE performance, we set all our students realistic yet challenging targets to reach their potential in their chosen courses. Support is tailored to ensure you can achieve your goals and can aspire to stretch yourself academically. We will also provide extra support where required.

You will be allocated a personal tutor for the duration of your time with us. You will meet your tutor daily to discuss academic and personal progress, and they will support you through the process of applying for university, apprenticeships or work placements.

You can also get support from dedicated learning mentors, who provide advice and guidance on any issues, concerns or questions you may have. This could involve wanting to change courses, obtaining information about higher education or training options, discussing problems outside of the sixth form setting or just simply needing to talk. There is also dedicated careers advice. information and guidance available in the Learning Resource Centre.

Funding

The government provides a funded 16-19 Bursary Fund for eligible students. This provides financial support to help cover the costs associated with further study, such as educational resources or equipment, transport and food for the days you attend sixth form, and professional clothing.

These bursaries provide students with access to up to £1,200 of funding for each year of their sixth form study. There are two types of bursary available, the vulnerable bursary and the discretionary bursary - students eligible for a bursary also receive an electronic device (such as a tablet), to further aid their learning during their time with us.

PAST SUCCESS



George Newton

A student of many talents, George accomplished great things during his time at Hucknall Sixth Form Centre – academically and personally. His achievements ensured that he reached his high aspirations, progressing to a place at Oxford University.

He said: "I chose this sixth form as I was impressed with the range of academic subjects, and I was familiar with the staff and how they could support my progress. Many of my friends were coming here too, so the transition from secondary was easy and felt like a good step on my educational journey."

Hard work and focus were key themes in George's time at sixth form, and this dedication to his studies resulted in a hugely impressive set of results, with four A* grades, confirming his place at Oxford to study Spanish and Portuguese. George, who speaks six languages, hopes to use this learning to set up language schools around Europe in the future, having already been tutoring younger students in foreign languages in his spare time.

George's advice to anyone considering studying at HSFC is: "Do what feels right for you. Everyone is different – work out which pathway is best for you and follow that. Staff will support and guide you, but hard work is essential too. I have achieved everything I wanted to here, and enjoyed every moment of it!"



Lisa Moyo

Lisa enjoyed a successful time in sixth form, achieving great things with her studies leading to exciting opportunities to carry on her education. Achieving top grades, she secured her first choice at higher education, and is now studying paramedicine at De Montfort University.

Crediting the guidance offered by staff for creating an environment to succeed, Lisa was extremely driven by her goals and engaged with a wealth of enrichment opportunities to further her development.

She said: "I have a passion for leadership and got involved in the student council together with accessing a Christian Young Leaders qualification outside of my studies. This, along with support from staff, developed my confidence and gave me new skills to apply to my studies and life in general – teachers are so responsive to any questions or issues you have, and the technology facilities at the centre enable you to be connected to them quickly."

Lisa's ambitions to become a paramedic were also clear in her Extended Project Qualification, where she produced a dissertation on the history of paramedic science. "Undertaking this project helped me to develop my research skills and academic discipline, and I really enjoyed completing it. The skills learned have been crucial in my university studies."



lason Yemm

Jason took a step away from his secondary academy by moving to study at Hucknall, with the decision proving to be a positive one. He achieved his education goals during his time here, rewarded with good grades, and is now studying criminology and law at Nottingham Trent University.

Despite not knowing many faces when he first walked through the door at HSFC, Jason was impressed with the community of students and the support from staff. He said: "The fact that all students are focused and have the mindset to study hard makes it easy to get to know people – this boosted my confidence. All the staff were also very friendly and together with giving great feedback in lessons, were on hand to offer advice and guidance at any time."

Jason really enjoyed the Extended Project Qualification, on which he did a dissertation based on ethics and family law, linking into his intended education and career pathway. He said: "Developing knowledge of how to write a dissertation properly, cite it and reference it has proven to be useful during my time at university so far! Studying at Hucknall Sixth Form Centre was a rewarding and valuable experience. The support given by teaching staff and my friends enabled my time here to be so successful."



Alex Brown

Alex has always known which direction he wanted his education and career path to go – and his brilliant results achieved at Hucknall Sixth Form Centre have sent him well on the way there.

Having always had ambitions to work in politics, Alex was able to study A levels that would allow him to pursue his dream. He said: "I chose history, politics and English literature as these fit with my chosen pathway. My aspiration is to work within government and eventually work my way up to being Prime Minister! Alongside my studies I have been doing voluntary work for local MP Mark Spencer, and have really enjoyed this."

Showing great focus in his studies, he also engaged in enrichment opportunities to further challenge himself. He was a key member of the debating society, showcasing his knowledge, research and presentation skills by successfully competing against other sixth forms. Achieving an impressive A*, two As and a B, Alex moved on to study politics at the London School of Economics. Of his time at HSFC, he said: "I chose to come here because I wanted to be with students and staff I knew, but being away from the academy gave me independence in a college-like environment. I have thrived here – students all work hard and the staff offer support when you need it and treat you like adults."

Applied law

(BTEC Level 3 – certificate/extended certificate)

Applied law is an engaging course providing students with an introduction to the legal sector. The course covers a wide range of legal issues including civil law, criminal law, the legal system and how all of these can be applied and interpreted. You will discover how laws are created and passed, different types of offences and sentences, together with learning about the court system and professions in the sector.

This course provides the basis of an excellent route for learners to pursue higher education study in law and to aspire to a career in the legal sector.

Applied science

(BTEC Level 3)

The course is designed to support students who wish to follow a pathway in science and combines well with study in biology. chemistry, physics and maths. You will learn about the principles and application of science, with a hands-on emphasis on learning about scientific procedures, investigations and techniques. All students will choose a specialist unit in physics, chemistry or biology as part of the course, together with covering a broad range of topics including cells and energy usage.

For students wishing to go into the fields of forensic science and maths, or look towards a career as a science technician, this is a superb course to take alongside other subjects.

(A Level and AS)

Our fine art course supports students to explore their creativity and encourages investigation and experimentation of materials, ideas. feelings and media. You will develop your knowledge of materials, technology and artists, learning about new concepts and building your own style and methods. The course covers sustainability, forms of presentation for different audiences, together with a focus on both historical and contemporary themes.

For individuals wishing to study at a higher level in art, design and illustration, this diverse and creative course will support those future aspirations.

You will learn about a wide variety of topics covering biological molecules and cells, how organisms adapt and relate to their environments, the transfer of energy between organisms, together with studying elements of genetics, populations, evolution and ecosystems.

Business

(Cambridge Technicals Level 3)

Our level 3 business course is ideal for students who have a genuine interest in the commercial world. As you develop your business skills and knowledge, you will complete coursework designed to solidify your understanding and enable you to pursue further study or careers in a related subject.

Chemistry

(A Level and AS)

The course will develop your interest in and enthusiasm for chemistry, learning about how the world works and the application of science. You will study organic and inorganic chemistry, discovering molecules used for fuels and medicine, finding out how these can be engineered and adapted, learning about elements and compounds, and expanding your knowledge of physical chemistry - the fundamental laws of nature that govern everything we are.

The course is a mixture of theoretical and practical work, developing your skills and techniques alongside solid base knowledge. Onward destinations for students at higher education include science-based subjects such as medicine, pharmacology and chemical engineering.

Business studies

(A Level and AS)

Business studies at A Level provides students with knowledge about why organisations make the decisions they do, looking at the strategic reasoning for this. You will discover the legal structures that a business can take, the roles of management in an organisation and how performance is measured and improved. The course will enable you to understand business models and analysis tools, together with finding out about key functional areas such as marketing, operations, finance and HR.

Childcare and education early years educator

(CACHE Level 3 Diploma)

Our full-time childcare and education course is equivalent to three A levels. You will learn the fundamentals working in early years education including how children develop through play, health and wellbeing, legislation and how to develop as a professional educator. The course is an interactive blend of classroom learning and work placements, with the skills and knowledge gained enabling you to move into careers working with children, family support and early vears education.

Together with your on-site learning at Hucknall Sixth Form Centre, you will be required to work or volunteer on a practical placement as an important part of the assessment process.

Computer science

(A Level and AS)

Computer science provides a framework within which you can consider complex problems and apply computational methods to create effective and efficient solutions. You will learn about computer systems, hardware, software and data exchange, together with a practical topic on evaluation of algorithms and developing programming techniques. Contemporary computer science issues such as the legal, moral, cultural and ethical issues associated with computer systems are also explored.

The course will enable you to analyse problems and critically evaluate solutions in a changing world. Students can move on to higher education courses relating to computer programming, systems analysis and careers in web development and STEM related industries.

Criminology

(Level 3 – applied certificate/diploma)

Criminology focuses on aspects of crime, linking theory with real life case studies – students consider how what we have learned from these cases impacts on individuals and society. You will learn about criminological theory and explanations of why people commit crime, together with exploring the changing public perception of crime and changes in law. Developing your knowledge of the criminal justice system and investigation process, you will also broaden your understanding and opinions of justice, crime, punishment and the agencies involved in these.

An interesting and diverse course, this could lead you to further study or jobs in social sciences and social work, legal professions, psychology or journalism.

Design technology - graphic products/resistant materials

(A Level and AS)

Students on our design technology course learn key skills and knowledge of manufacturing processes and materials to produce usable and aesthetically pleasing products. You will learn about everyday objects and the technology used to produce them, developing your own individual design and make project - this gives you the opportunity to show off your abilities to meet a brief in an imaginative manner, researching the issue, proposing ideas and manufacturing solutions to a high quality.

An exciting and creative course, design technology can support students who are aspiring to careers in architecture, product design, industrial design and engineering.

Design media

(Cambridge Technicals Level 3)

Design media is designed to build on your ICT knowledge and skills to support a continuation of your studies or enter careers in creative digital arts.

The course will develop your understanding through topics such as media products and their audiences, production and planning, and creation of a product. The practical element of the course enables you to develop a product through from audience identification, to legalities associated with product development, through to the creation and deployment of the product. Students also have the opportunity to extend their knowledge in specific areas of the media by choosing additional units from topics such as TV production, media scripting and marketing a product.

Engineering

(BTEC Level 3 National Extended Certificate)

Studying engineering will give you an understanding of how electrical, electronic and mechanical systems work, applying engineering theory to real-life examples to tackle problem-solving challenges. You will learn about systems and processes and the science behind these, together with deepening your knowledge and skill of engineering disciplines such as design, production and manufacturing.

Combining practical and theoretical learning, this course can lead on to further study at degree level or into careers such as electronic engineering, mechanical engineering, computer aided design (CAD) or into areas such as architecture and systems design.



Bus


There are a number of public bus services that service Hucknall, with Trent Barton bus stops just a short walk from the centre (less than 1 mile) on both their Hucknall Connect Blue and Green routes. The Trent Barton 'Threes' service also runs between Nottingham and Mansfield in both directions, with the Vine Terrace stop almost on the doorstep of the Hucknall Sixth Form Centre.

Train and tram

Hucknall station, also formerly known as Hucknall Byron station, is the nearest railway station and tram stop, and a great way to access the centre. The station is just one mile from the Hucknall Sixth Form Centre, taking approximately 10 minutes to walk.
