WELCOMING STUDENTS FROM OTHER SCHOOLS

At HSFC we are pleased to welcome students into Year 12 who may not have attended one of our 'home academies'.

Students are invited to join us for our open evenings and to submit an application to join us. All applicants who apply by our deadline and are likely to meet our entry criteria will be invited to interview with our Head of Centre

Support for students

When new students join us, they will be put on to the roll of one of our home academies. This has very little impact for students directly, but will be the centre at which exams are sat. All 6th form students will have a personal tutor to support the transition into year 12 and beyond. Alongside enrichment at HSFC, students can take

advantage of student leadership opportunities at main school.

SMSC and CEIAG

Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural development (SMSC) is embedded throughout the curriculum and wider aspects of 6th form life as well as the tutor and enrichment programmes.

All students will have access to a variety of experiences and Careers Information, advice and guidance (CEIAG) in order to inform and make progress towards their post 18 options.

Eden Burch joined HSFC having not attended one of our home academies.

On results day, she was thrilled to see her four straight A grades and has now headed off to St Andrews – her first choice university. Eden said: "I'm really glad I moved to The Holgate Academy and studied at the Hucknall Sixth Form Centre for my post 16 studies. It was the best move I've ever made. I am going to follow my dream and study neuroscience at St Andrews." Eden was an excellent student who always aspired to achieve high grades in her studies. When asked about what made her a successful student, Eden said: "I was really pleased with the way my teachers allowed me to develop my skills and work independently. I don't always learn the same way as everyone else and my teachers at HSFC have helped me to progress so much, I am so pleased with the grades I have achieved. The way teachers at HSFC adjusted their teaching to help me learn was excellent." When asked about her future plans, Eden added: "My ambition now is to complete my neuroscience degree at St Andrews. Once I have completed that I want to train to become a neuro surgeon and HSFC has helped me on this journey.



STUDY WITH US

Our students travel from across Nottinghamshire to join a post-16 community with strong academic principles and values, dedicated to achievement and positive outcomes.

We aim for all our students to be successful and develop into professional, educated young people. Our intention is that students will achieve to the best of their abilities and either continue their studies at university, in higher or degree apprenticeships, or move directly into employment.

The centre is based in a purpose-built academic building which was refurbished in 2019, creating a fresh and vibrant facility designed for learning, independent study and personal development. This outstanding location is supported by specialist facilities at our partner academies, enabling specific subject areas to expand and enhance students' understanding of their course.





Our learning environments for lessons are light and spacious, and our Learning Resource Centre is a great area for independent study. PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT AND ENRICHMENT

We encourage all students to develop and enhance skills essential to moving into higher education and employment – we know that means much more than just academic achievement alone.

You will have access to opportunities both within and outside of lessons, so you can learn and hone new skills, or further develop your existing talents, to support you in life beyond sixth form.

We encourage personal development and expect all students to participate in at least one aspect of our enrichment programme, which includes but is not limited to

- | debate society
- | student council
- | first-aid
- | performing arts
- | charity work
- | student leadership team
- | guest lectures

Each week we timetable an enrichment period, in which we invite external speakers in to deliver inspiring and informative sessions. These offer thought-provoking discussion, reflection and independent research, and have previously included safe driving, drugs and alcohol, safe sex, the importance of voting, banking and higher education.

Visits and international travel

Linked to a number of courses are opportunities to experience new cultures and environments, and to discover how you can apply your studies in real life contexts. We arrange visits throughout the year, both in the UK and further afield. In previous years, our students have ventured to Switzerland, Germany, Poland, Spain and France to name a few – putting their learning and knowledge into practice.

You will also be given the opportunity to visit some of the country's top universities to get a feel for what to expect from an academic, personal development and social perspective.

Work experience

In year 12, you will complete work experience related to your career of choice or the education pathway you wish to follow. You will be expected to select, apply and interview for roles, and represent both yourself and Hucknall Sixth Form Centre in a professional, business-like manner.

| Core & Further Maths

In addition to their studies, students are invited to apply for supplementary courses in Core or Further Maths. These will run to AS level and will be in addition to the 3 main subject areas studied.

STAND OUT FROM THE CROWD

THE EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION

All of our year 13 students complete the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) as part of their ongoing development and study. The EPQ is highly valued by universities and businesses as evidence of a range of transferable skills required for higher education and employment.

In the EPQ, you will have the opportunity to choose your own topic area to research, ideally linked to your future studies or career aspirations. You will produce either a 5,000 word research dissertation on this topic or develop an artefact alongside a research report. You will then plan, research, develop and evaluate your project throughout the year. This is supported by sessions which build on skills such as independent study and research, organisation, time management, presentation skills and reflection.

Successful past dissertation EPQ projects include diverse projects on business marketing, psychological and biological research into Alzheimer's and autism, causes of the Spanish Civil War, causes of the 2008 economic crash, and the development of paramedic science and dentistry. Examples of excellent artefact EPQ projects include architectural design, jewellery making, photography, creative writing and computer programming.

The EPQ will give you a sense of achievement, an opportunity for individual research on a topic you are interested in and a very valuable qualification for inclusion on UCAS or job applications.



ADVICE AND GUIDANCE

We have a defined support system for all of our students, helping you to achieve your potential and aspire to reach further. We offer both pastoral and academic support, with guidance on financial, educational and career matters.

Reports & Targets

You will receive regular updates on your progress from your course teachers and personal tutors. Based on your GCSE performance, we set all our students realistic yet challenging targets to reach their potential in their chosen courses. Support is tailored to ensure you can achieve your goals and can aspire to stretch yourself academically. We will also provide extra support where required.

Tutors

You will be allocated a personal tutor for the duration of your time with us. You will meet your tutor daily to discuss academic and personal progress, and they will support you through the process of applying for university, apprenticeships or work placements.

Student Welfare Officer

You can also get support from our Student Welfare Officer, who provides advice and guidance on any issues, concerns or questions you may have. This could involve study support, discussing problems outside of the sixth form setting or just simply needing to talk.

Counselling

To support our students with their mental health and wellbeing, we have an on-site counsellor for one day per week. Students are also welcome to refer themselves to counselling through their home academies.

Careers Guidance

There is also dedicated careers advice, information and guidance available in the Learning Resource Centre. Students are welcome to request 1-2-1 careers support meetings at any time.

Chaplaincy

Through our collaboration with Church of England academies, any of our students are welcome to access the services of our school chaplains.

Funding

The government provides a funded 16-19 Bursary Fund for eligible students. This provides financial support to help cover the costs associated with further study, such as educational resources or equipment, transport and food for the days you attend sixth form, and professional clothing.

These bursaries provide students with access to up to £1,200 of funding for each year of their sixth form study. There are two types of bursary available, the vulnerable bursary and the discretionary bursary – students eligible for a bursary also receive an electronic device (such as a tablet), to further aid their learning during their time with us.

Applied law

(BTEC Level 3 – certificate/extended certificate)

Applied law is an engaging course providing students with an introduction to the legal sector. The course covers a wide range of legal issues including civil law, criminal law, the legal system and how all of these can be applied and interpreted. You will discover how laws are created and passed, different types of offences and sentences, together with learning about the court system and professions in the sector.

This course provides the basis of an excellent route for learners to pursue higher education study in law and to aspire to a career in the legal sector.

Applied science

(BTEC Level 3)

The course is designed to support students who wish to follow a pathway in science and combines well with study in biology, chemistry, physics and maths. You will learn about the principles and application of science, with a hands-on emphasis on learning about scientific procedures, investigations and techniques.

For students wishing to go into the fields of forensic science and maths, or look towards a career as a science technician, this is a superb course to take alongside other subjects.

Art – fine

(A Level)

Our fine art course supports students to explore their creativity and encourages investigation and experimentation of materials, ideas, feelings and media. You will develop your knowledge of materials, technology and artists, learning about new concepts and building your own style and methods. The course covers sustainability, forms of presentation for different audiences, together with a focus on both historical and contemporary themes.

For individuals wishing to study at a higher level in art, design and illustration, this diverse and creative course will support those future aspirations.

Biology

(A Level)

An interesting and inspiring course, A Level biology will nurture your passion for this specific science subject. You will learn about a wide variety of topics covering biological molecules and cells, how organisms adapt and relate to their environments, the transfer of energy between organisms, together with studying elements of genetics, populations, evolution and ecosystems.

The course lays the groundwork for further study and careers in areas such as biological sciences, animal sciences and medicine.

Business (applied)

(Cambridge Technicals Level 3)

Our level 3 business course is ideal for students who have a genuine interest in the commercial world. As you develop your business skills and knowledge, you will complete coursework designed to solidify your understanding and enable you to pursue further study or careers in a related subject.

Chemistry

(A Level)

The course will develop your interest in and enthusiasm for chemistry, learning about how the world works and the application of science. You will study organic and inorganic chemistry, discovering molecules used for fuels and medicine, finding out how these can be engineered and adapted, learning about elements and compounds, and expanding your knowledge of physical chemistry – the fundamental laws of nature that govern everything we are.

The course is a mixture of theoretical and practical work, developing your skills and techniques alongside solid base knowledge. Onward destinations for students at higher education include science-based subjects such as medicine, pharmacology and chemical engineering.

Computer science

(A Level)

Computer science provides a framework within which you can consider complex problems and apply computational methods to create effective and efficient solutions. You will learn about computer systems, hardware, software and data exchange, together with a practical topic on evaluation of algorithms and developing programming techniques. Contemporary computer science issues such as the legal, moral, cultural and ethical issues associated with computer systems are also explored.

The course will enable you to analyse problems and critically evaluate solutions in a changing world. Students can move on to higher education courses relating to computer programming, systems analysis and careers in web development and STEM related industries.

Criminology



Transport and travel to the centre

Bus

There are a number of public bus services that service Hucknall, with Trent Barton bus stops just a short walk from the centre (less than 1 mile) on both their Hucknall Connect Blue and Green routes. The Trent Barton 'Threes' service also runs between

Nottingham and Mansfield in both directions, with the Vine Terrace stop almost on the doorstep of the Hucknall Sixth Form Centre.
